

AUSTRALIA & SOUTH PACIFIC WINNER: BORA BORA

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Polynesia's perfect island locale has mastered the recipe for relaxation. But it's not resting on its laurels: With each passing year, this destination adds layers—another overwater bungalow, a brilliantly reimagined culinary program—to its flawless turquoise gloss. Here are some of those new ways to enjoy paradise (as well as to get there in the first place). —Brandon Presser

Take Flight

Though already accessible via Honolulu and LAX, this coveted destination continues to blossom, thanks to several new airline routes. In May, French Bee (frenchbee.com), a low-cost carrier from France, started direct service between San Francisco and Tahiti, the hub from which to reach the other islands of French Polynesia. And United (united.com) has recently kicked off a similar path, greatly increasing the capacity for new travelers.


Stay on the Water

Bora Bora and overwater bungalow are practically synonymous terms, and local resorts continue to flaunt their suites on stilts. Conrad Bora Bora Nui (from \$750 per night, conradhotels3 .hilton.com) has quite literally kicked things up a notch by adding double-decker bungalows, the first of their kind in the area. But if there's anything better

than the stillness of a villa over the impossibly blue water, it's the chance to float around it: Try a private three- or six-night cruise with Tahiti Yacht Charter (from \$5,280 for a private three-night charter, tahitiyacht charter.com), and wake up each morning to a different face of moody Mount Otemanu, the cloud-shredding rock spire at the center of the island. Complete with your own hostess and chef, each personal vessel gently glides around the famous lagoons as it angles itself for snorkeling sessions with rays and optimal sunset vistas.

Dine Local

In the South Pacific, "local" and "seasonal" themes translate to a delightful assortment of exotic flavors. Kick off your sandals at **Bloody Mary's** (bloody marys.com), and let the chef choose his favorite catch of the day, such as lobster or mahi mahi, served on cracked ice. For

FIJI

Still rebuilding more than two years after the Southern Hemisphere's strongest recorded cyclone, the island nation is back with a vacationing vengeance, offering new digs like Six Senses Fiji and Kokomo Private Island Fiji, with its \$100 million investment.

TAHITI

French Polynesia's most populous island does an admirable job of embracing both its vacation flair and authentic island life. Skip the campus-size resorts and opt for a private pied-dans-l'eau villa from Tahiti Homes, complete with concierge service.

SYDNEY, AUSTRALIA Hire Culture Scouts

for a private walking tour of one of the city's upwardly trending neighborhoods, like the freshly revitalized Chippendale—a derelict brewery district now amped up with glass spires, compelling cafés, hawker stalls, and galleries.

WELLINGTON, NEW ZEALAND

As the jumping-off point for the upper recesses of South Island, this North Island city allows you to engage in the rich traditions of the Maori, set against the dramatic fjord-like setting, via Māori Tours Kaikōura.



something decidedly more haute, sip cocktails infused with local passionfruit at the MaiKai Marina & Yacht Club Bora Bora (maikaimarina.com), or make a reservation for dinner at La Villa Mahana (villamahana.com) and feast on the spectacular Epicurean Menu, which lifts Tahitian fare to lofty standards. A standout among resortdining offerings is the Four Seasons Resort and Residences Bora Bora (fourseasons.com/ borabora), which diligently weaves island-grown produce, like silky-sweet fei (sweet potato meets plantain), fragrant vanilla blooms, and delicate Moorean prawns into its internationalcuisine offerings.
